Breaking New Ground: Crystal Atkinson's Journey as the First daVinci Robotic Surgery Patient at Good Samaritan

Crystal Atkinson's journey as the first robotic surgery patient at Good Samaritan was unexpected, but her resilience and the steadfast support of her medical team were evident every step of the way.

"Being the first robotic surgery patient at Good Samaritan was surprising, but it taught me that sometimes, embracing the unknown can lead to incredible breakthroughs in health care," stated Crystal Atkinson, a Good Samaritan patient. "I'm grateful for the opportunity to be part of medical history and to inspire hope for future patients."

Crystal had been grappling with health issues stemming from low iron levels and female-related concerns, despite prior medical treatments. Her primary care provider, Dr. Kristin Mahan, directed her to Dr. Dustin Blackwell for an ablation procedure. This set Crystal on a path that eventually made her the pioneer patient for da Vinci robotic surgery at Good Samaritan.

The decision to undergo hysterectomy surgery came swiftly when Dr. Blackwell proposed scheduling surgery the next day, as part of the launch of the da Vinci system. Despite the suddenness of the decision, Crystal found reassurance in the presence of the entire surgical team, including various specialists and technicians.

Dustin Blackwell, DO, Good Samaritan Obstetrics and Gynecology Surgeon stated, "Performing the first da Vinci robotic surgery at Good Samaritan fills me with immense excitement and pride. This technology marks a new era in surgical precision and patient care within our community. With the da Vinci system, we can offer our patients minimally invasive procedures with unparalleled precision, shorter recovery times, and improved outcomes. It's a privilege to be at the forefront of advancing medical technology to benefit our patients' health and well-being."



Reflecting on her recovery, Crystal was pleasantly surprised by the minimal pain she experienced post-surgery. Her expectations of excruciating pain were defied, and she found herself recovering faster than anticipated. The support of her family, particularly her husband, and the care provided by the hospital staff made a significant difference in her healing process.

Despite the uncertainties leading up to the surgery, Crystal's experience was marked by a sense of awe and gratitude. She marveled at the da Vinci system's advanced technology and her surgical team's skill. The open house event where she got to see the robot up close further deepened her appreciation for the innovative technology that had played a crucial role in her surgery. "I am so grateful for the care I received and the positive outcomes of my surgery. I want to acknowledge Dr. Blackwell and the surgical team for their excitement and dedication. Their enthusiasm for the new technology helped ease my anxieties," stated Crystal.

As Crystal looked back on her journey, she couldn't help but feel a sense of wonder at the advancements in medical science that had made her surgery possible. Her story is a testament to the power of perseverance, the importance of supportive care, and the transformative impact of cutting-edge medical technology.

Beyond her exceptional patient care, Phyllis has played a pivotal role in shaping the future of nursing. She has oriented and mentored hundreds of new nurses, many of whom have risen to prominent positions as nurse leaders and nurse practitioners. These nurses have carried forward the values and skills imparted by Phyllis, ensuring her legacy of compassionate care and professional excellence continues to thrive.

Wellness Fair Miracle: Judith Eaton's Life-Saving Discovery

For years, Judith Eaton had been a familiar face at the Good Samaritan Women's Wellness Fair. She had dedicated much of her professional life to Good Samaritan, retiring from there in 2014. Even after retirement, her commitment to health and wellness never wavered, as she regularly attended the annual fair to stay on top of her health.

In 2022, Judith attended the fair with her usual enthusiasm. As part of her routine check-up, she had blood drawn for a series of tests, including a lipid profile, blood sugar, and a glomerular filtration rate (GFR). When she received her results through MyChart, she noticed something concerning: her GFR was 49, well below the normal level of 60 for women her age.

Judith immediately took action and scheduled an appointment with her primary care provider, Vonetta Vories, NP-C. Vonetta, sharing Judith's concern, referred her to a kidney specialist for further evaluation. To her relief, Judith's kidneys were fine. However, the specialist discovered something unexpected —a parathyroid adenoma that was causing the abnormal results.

As Judith prepared for the surgery to address the adenoma, she underwent pre-operative testing, including blood work and an electrocardiogram (EKG). Shockingly, Judith, who had felt perfectly healthy, failed the EKG. Further tests, including a treadmill test with Dr. Larry Herron at Good Samaritan and a stress test, also revealed concerning results. Ultimately, a heart catheterization with Dr. Philip Bacidore confirmed the need for immediate intervention.

Dr. Bacidore delivered the sobering news: Judith needed to be transported by ambulance to Evansville for open heart surgery. Reflecting on this moment, Judith shared, "My doctors in Evansville said that I was so lucky that this was found. I didn't have any symptoms. So I think I'm pretty lucky."

Judith's journey underscores the critical importance of regular health screenings. "You can feel just fine but have an underlying problem that you know nothing about. This was a total shock. I had no symptoms. Make sure you stay on top of your health," Judith emphasized.

Despite the ordeal, Judith remains an advocate for the Women's Wellness Fair, continuing to attend annually. She praises the fair for its comprehensive services: "They have so many other great booths at the fair like nutrition, exercise, bone density and blood pressure checks. It's a great service for the community."

Judith Eaton's story is a powerful reminder of the importance of proactive health monitoring and the potentially life-saving benefits of community health initiatives like the Good Samaritan Women's Wellness Fair. Her journey from a routine wellness check to life-saving surgery highlights how seemingly ordinary events can lead to extraordinary outcomes. Through her experience, Judith encourages everyone to prioritize their health, even when they feel perfectly fine.



Expenditures per Dollar Collected


Expenditures per dollar collected is the percent of money used for each dollar collected by Good Samaritan.

Community Impact - 2023

Women's Wellness Fair

Women have a habit of neglecting their own health. This is why Good Samaritan hosts the "Women's Wellness Fair" event every year. In June of 2023, the 18th annual women's health event encouraged 337 women attending to make their own health a priority. Offering health screenings and educational information from hospital departments pertaining to women's health.

Men's Wellness Fair

Men often fail to pay attention to their health. This is why the annual "Men's Wellness Fair" is just for them. The 2023 event, attended by 416 men, offered five health screenings and hospital departments were also in attendance to provide education and information helpful to the health and well-being of men in the community. The 2024 Men's Wellness Fair is scheduled for October 8.

Stop the Bleed

Good Samaritan Trauma provided multiple free "Stop the Bleed" classes to the community in 2023. These classes prepare individuals to address traumatic injuries and act fast to prevent blood loss and save lives. In 2023, the Trauma Department offered classes and taught a total of 329 community members these life-saving techniques.

Head and Neck Cancer Screening

Good Samaritan partnered with the Knox County Health Department to provide head and neck cancer screenings along with tobacco cessation information. There were a total of 92 screenings completed.

In addition to enhancing the health and well-being of the communities it serves, Good Samaritan also contributes significantly to the local area's economic health. In 2023, the estimated total annual local economic impact by Good Samaritan was \$279,456,363.

Providing Well-Paying, Consistent Employment

 Dollars earned by Good Samaritan employees and spent on groceries, clothing, mortgage payments, rent, etc., generate approximately \$121,101,101 in economic activity and create an additional 1,925 jobs for the local economy.
